Meet Sherman

Even with shelter doors closed to public visits, homeless animals still need your help.

In April, a litter of three-week-old kittens was rescued from a burning brush pile. The smell of smoke entered the exam room before them and lingered long after they left. The Bonfire kittens (Reginald, Abe, Maria and Sherman) were a sorry sight. Smoke had filled their little lungs, fire had seared their fur and whiskers. Poor little Sherman had the worst injuries— one ear tip and most of his whiskers burned off. Staff immediately went to work giving them what they needed—rehydrating fluids, ointment for burns, syringe feedings and a safe, quiet place to heal. Several weeks in foster care, and they are gaining weight and confidence and getting ready to go to their new homes.

BoBo was so thin, her back bowed and it was difficult for her to simply sit down. Even so, she would slowly make her way over and rest her head in your lap. During round-the-clock hand feeding, it was discovered that poor BoBo couldn't find her food and water bowl even though it was right under her nose. She needs to see an ophthalmologist and a neurologist to determine the extent of her deficiencies and make a treatment plan. This new fund will help her. For now, BoBo is in foster care reveling in her new energy and keeping her foster family on their toes.

YOUR membership support is key to making that life saving help possible, not only for BoBo and the Bonfire kittens but for all the animals who come through our doors.


